Postdoctoral Travel Policy

The Office of Postdoctoral Affairs developed an SOP for Postdoc Travel outlines procedures to assist postdoctoral scholars with business travel expenses at UNC-Chapel Hill. Departments can use P-Cards for conference registration, while airfare and hotel bookings must be made through Concur, requiring pre-travel approval. Postdocs may request travel advances for expenses like ground transportation, hotels, and per diems, with unused funds returned to the University. Expense reconciliation and reimbursement are managed through Concur. For assistance, postdocs should contact their department business manager, UNC Travel Services, or the Concur Support Desk. UNC Postdoc Medical Plan

ABOUT

- Provides health coverage for eligible postdoctoral scholars classified as Postdoc Research Associates or Postdoc Research Trainees working full-time and enrolled in the UNC Payroll system.
- Administered by Blue Cross and Blue Shield of North Carolina (BCBSNC) under the 'Student Blue' plan.
- Includes comprehensive health benefits, including vision and dental coverage for postdoctoral scholars.
- Postdocs are automatically enrolled in the health plan, with coverage starting on the first of the month after their hire date.
- Monthly premiums for individual postdocs are fully covered by the institution (department or funding source).
- Dependents' premiums (for spouses or children) are paid by the postdoc and can be added during open enrollment or after qualifying life events.
- Postdocs who choose not to enroll must sign <u>a waiver form</u>.
- Postdocs have access to cost-effective care through Campus Health Services on the UNC-Chapel Hill campus.

ENROLLMENT

To view your account, change your address, or enroll dependents, <u>login to the Student Blue Dashboard</u>.

OPEN ENROLLMENT

Open Enrollment is held annually from July 1 - July 31. If a spouse and/or children are not currently insured under this plan, the Postdoc may add dependents during the open-enrollment period. Otherwise, dependents may only be added within the first 30 days of hire or with a qualifying life event (birth, death, job change, etc.).

ELIGIBILITY

- In order to be eligible for the Postdoc Medical Insurance Plan, the Postdoc must hold the HR position title of a postdoctoral trainee or postdoctoral research associate and be on payroll at least 30 hours per week.
- Eligible postdocs are automatically enrolled via the monthly enrollment file by UNC payroll to BCBSNC following the postdoc's appointment date. For example, if a Postdoc's appointment date is December 1, BCBSNC will be notified of that Postdoc's eligibility at the end of December and coverage will begin on the following month (for this example, January 1).
- Postdocs can complete enrollment for dependents, change their mailing address or terminate coverage using the online portal provided by Student Blue NC <u>website</u>. Coverage begins on the first day of the month following the month of the Postdoc's appointment effective date. If the Postdoc wishes to opt out of the plan, they must sign the <u>waiver form</u>.
- If a Postdoc enrolls a dependent, monthly premiums (initial TWO months) will be deducted from their paycheck. Future monthly premiums will be a payroll deduction.

CONFIRMING YOUR ENROLLMENT

- Confirm with your department that your hire action was fully completed in the HR system, ConnectCarolina.
- Once your hire action is completed, on or after your start date, you should login to ConnectCarolina > Self Service > Personal Information > Addresses and ensure that you have a domestic (US) address on file for your home address. You can edit this address, if needed.
- Within 5-10 days after your hire date, you will be able to login to the BCBS portal, using your UNC email to get a one-time passcode. Here, you can ensure that your address and other contact information is correct, and update if needed. This BCBS portal is where you can confirm your enrollment status in the UNC Postdoc Health Plan. Please note that postdocs cannot enroll or view enrollment in Medical/Dental/Vision coverage via the Benefits tile in ConnectCarolina (this is for permanent employees only).
- Postdocs are automatically enrolled in the Postdoc Health Plan effective the first of the month after their hire date. You should receive an ID card mailed to that address within the first week of that month, but you can also get a digital card from Student Blue (BCBS) if needed urgently.
- Postdocs (and spouses, if you are covering them) also get access to visit Campus Health
 on the first of the month after your hire date. Before your first visit to Campus Health,

postdocs should complete the <u>Campus Health Services packet</u> and turn it in either in person or via mail (including campus mail).

ENROLLING DEPENDENTS

Visit the BCBS portal to enroll dependents. within your first 30 days. Dependent coverage is also effective on the first of the month after the hire date. The <u>Student Blue Dashboard Guide</u> can help you to navigate this process.

ID CARDS

It typically takes about 45 days from a postdoc's appointment date for the Postdoc to receive an ID card. The ID card can also be viewed online using the Student Blue NC website 7-10 days after your appointment effective date. The Student Blue Dashboard Guide has instructions on how you can view your enrollment and update your mailing address as a newly enrolled postdoc. We highly recommend that you do this as soon as possible so your card does not get mailed to your previous address.

Campus Health Services

CAMPUS HEALTH

Campus Health is an on-campus health care provider for students and postdoctoral fellows. Campus Health offers comprehensive primary medical care at a reduced cost, including general health evaluations, laboratory testing, radiology, and pharmacy services. Postdocs and their spouses or partners enrolled in the Student Blue medical plan receive financial benefits by using Campus Health as their primary care provider. Campus Health is located in the <u>James A. Taylor Building</u>, CB# 7470, Chapel Hill, NC 27599.

The fee to access Campus Health is \$42.50 per month, but like the health insurance fee, this is fully covered by the institution (department or funding source). For spouses/partners to access Campus Health, the \$42.50 fee must be covered by the postdoc. Spouses must provide proof of

insurance and marital status and pay the health fee to access services, but children must seek medical care outside of Campus Health Services due to coverage limitations.

Postdocs need to <u>complete the Campus Health Services Packet</u> and either mail it to CHS at Campus Health Services at James A. Taylor Building, CB 7470, Chapel Hill, NC 27599 or bring the completed forms to their first visit.

Campus Health operates two pharmacies on campus:

- Campus Health Pharmacy, located on the ground floor of the Campus Health building.
- Student Stores Pharmacy, located in the Student Stores on South Road.

Both pharmacies provide prescription services, over-the-counter medications, and various health products. Postdocs enrolled in the Student Blue Medical Plan enjoy reduced rates when using the Campus Health Pharmacy and the Student Stores Pharmacy for their prescriptions.

Campus Health at UNC-Chapel Hill offers dental services through <u>Campus Smiles</u>, conveniently located within the Campus Health facility. Campus Smiles provides comprehensive dental care, including exams, cleanings, fillings, crowns, root canals, and cosmetic services like teeth whitening and Invisalign. They accept all major PPO insurance plans and are open five days a week.

COUNSELING AND PSYCOLOGICAL SERVICES (CAPS)

Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) is a key component of Campus Health, providing specialized mental health support alongside the broader medical services offered by Campus Health. CAPS provides mental health services to postdoctoral fellows, including initial assessments, brief therapy, group counseling, medication management, and academic interventions. Walk-in hours for new appointments are Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. CAPS also offers crisis intervention services during business hours, with a 24/7 support line available at (919) 966-3658 for urgent needs. In addition to individual and couples therapy, CAPS hosts wellness workshops and provides educational resources on stress management, fitness, and substance use.

Wellness services at Campus Health offer education and health promotion programs designed to support various aspects of well-being, including fitness and nutrition, alcohol and substance use, stress management, massage therapy, and sexual behavior. These programs aim to empower individuals with the tools and knowledge needed to maintain a healthy and balanced lifestyle.

Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) is situated on the third floor of the James A. Taylor Building within Campus Health.

The Benefits Services Department of the UNC Office of Human Resources (HR) operates Work-Life programs, at no cost, designed to help meet the needs of students and postdocs who have responsibilities for children and elderly relatives or adults dependent on them for care. The office provides, at no cost, childcare information, including an information network of local childcare resources, a directory of family daycare and in-home providers, a childcare assistance program and a summer recreation program. Lending agencies may differ in their deferral requirements, and therefore will make the final determination of eligibility. You are, however, responsible for timely payment of any unsubsidized loans. CONTINUING EDUCATION

Formerly known as the Friday Center for Continuing Education, Digital and Lifelong Learning is UNC-Chapel Hill's central resource for online, flexible, and lifelong learning. For graduate-level courses, you will need permission from the professor teaching the course to register for the class. Postdocs are not eligible for the employee tuition waiver, so the cost will be out of pocket for all courses at the university. Postdoctoral scholars at UNC-Chapel Hill can audit lecture-based courses by obtaining permission from both the course instructor and department chair. Auditors are exempt from assignments, exams, and class discussions unless the instructor specifies otherwise. A \$20 fee per course applies, payable to the University Cashier's Office. Auditing does not provide course credit. To proceed, postdocs should complete the necessary registration forms and submit them to the University Registrar's Office after the official registration period has concluded and if space is available in the desired class. Postdocs should read carefully the criteria on the University Registrar's Office for more information.

Campus Parking

Finding a place to park on or near campus is virtually impossible, although early birds can sometimes nab a space on Cameron Avenue around 7:00 a.m. You can also vie for metered parking on Raleigh Street or Franklin Street if you are planning on coming into campus for only a few hours. If you absolutely must drive to campus, you can usually find a spot in one of the public lots or garages on Franklin Street or Rosemary Street, but these will run you between \$6 and \$10 per day. If you plan to park your car at UNC or UNC Hospitals between 7:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on weekdays, you will have to apply for a parking permit from the Department of Transportation and Parking. Fees for the permits vary depending on the parking zone to which you are assigned. Your assigned zone will be the only zone in which you will be allowed to park, and you must display your permit. However, after 5:00 p.m. on weekdays, and on weekends, you can park in any unreserved space with the exception of those in resident student lots, which do not become available until 9:00 p.m.

NOTE: Parking spaces and parking permits for on-campus parking are allocated per individual departments. Please contact your HR facilitator or parking coordinator for information, fees, and availability of permits.

Vehicles parked illegally may be cited by Parking Enforcement and subsequent violations may result in further citations, immobilization ("booting") of a vehicle, or towing. Citations may be appealed through the Department of Transportation and Parking's Appeals Office within (10) days of citation. To appeal a citation, visit www.dps.unc.edu.

Chapel Hill Transit operates over 15 fixed bus routes, which provide service to the towns of Chapel Hill and Carrboro and the UNC-Chapel Hill campus. The routes cover most of the apartment complexes in the Chapel Hill/Carrboro area. Buses run more frequently in the mornings and late afternoons; on weekends, they run on a much-reduced schedule. During the summer, on holidays, and on days when the University is closed, the buses also run on a reduced schedule. In an effort to reduce traffic congestion and the number of vehicles parked on campus, the Commuter Alternatives Program is designed to reward UNC faculty, staff and students who do not drive a Single Occupancy Vehicle (SOV) to commute to campus. The program is free and only requires that the CAP registrant commute to school or work, and not hold an SOV permit. If you are currently commuting using an alternative mode, you are already a part of this effort, so please take the time to join. The Commuter Alternatives Program encourages all forms of alternative transportation including bicycling, walking, transit, park and ride, carpool and vanpool, and Zipcar (UNC car sharing program – see below).

Postdocs are eligible for the Employee CAP program. To join the program, visit the above website to register online. Benefits include free bike registration, access to all Park and Ride lots, local merchant discounts, free local transportation, free temporary parking passes, local prize drawings, and Zipcar discounts.
